

What is the foundation of or basis for Irelands commitment?

- (2001/55 EC)
 - The Temporary Protection Directive (2001/55 EC) is an EU law that was introduced in 2001.
 - The Directive created a special procedure to deal with a 'mass influx' of people in need of international protection. The Directive had to be proposed by the EU Commission and accepted by a vote of the European Council.
 - This Directive has been activated by <u>EU Council Decision EU 2022/382</u> of 4 March 2022, to provide immediate protection in EU countries for people displaced by the Russian invasion of Ukraine.
 - The Directive was adopted into Irish law by Section 60 of the International Protection Act 2015 and was activated for the first time in March 2022 in response to the war in Ukraine.


In essence –

- The European Commission (EC) has invoked the <u>Temporary Protection Directive</u> in order to offer quick and effective assistance in European countries to people fleeing the Russian invasion of Ukraine
 - Protection & rights,
 - Reduce pressure on National Asylum System
 - Solidarity and Responsibility Sharing,
 - Secure further EU Agency Support (i.e. Asylum Agencies, Europol etc.)

Beneficiaries:

- Member states provide temporary protection 'Beneficiaries of Temporary Protection' (BOTP)
 - 1) Ukrainian nationals residing in Ukraine who have been displaced on or after 24 February 2022 and their family members;
 - 2) Stateless persons, and nationals of third countries other than Ukraine, who benefitted from international protection or equivalent national protection in Ukraine before 24 February 2022 and who have been displaced from Ukraine on or after 24 February 2022, and their family members
- Member States shall grant access to their education system to persons under 18 years old enjoying the temporary protection status under the same conditions as their own nationals and EU citizens.

Temporary Protection Supports:



- permission to reside in Ireland for a period of 1 year, and the permission may be extended for further periods after that
- full access to the labour market
- access to accommodation, if needed
- social welfare income supports
- access to education
- access to medical care
- Centres are currently in Dublin, Limerick and Cork.

The dashboard below gives a visual representation of the location of the Ukrainian arrivals in Ireland at an LEA level. The location data behind this is derived from DSP data, based on the most recent Post Office location or the home address from the Accommodation Recognition Payments (ARP). If a current home address is available for a person from the ARP data, it is selected over the Post Office address for LEA mapping purposes, otherwise the Post Office address is utilised.




- This dataset represents

- Further improvements are planned as the dashboard will evolve as the maturity of the data progresses


Ukrainain Arrivals Location Analysis

Example of Impact Areas

Communities

- Communities concern over numbers in Clare & possible increase over coming months when tourism season eases
- Community groups are tired after Covid and initial reaction to Ukraine crisis

Education

- Impact on school places in areas such as Shannon, Ennis, Lisdoonvarna
- School transport concerns with Ukrainians currently awaiting school transport support
- Schools lacking resources and financial support. No extra physical space and also no budgets for additional cost of supplies and materials.

Health concerns

- Lack of available GPs in the county and existing GP are at or above capacity *
- Out of hours services: High density of Ukrainians in Ennistimon / Lisdoonvarna [circa 1200] and Shannon Doc is in Miltown Malbay ...Concerns over March 2023 when hotels may start to seek rooms back



Current National Strategy

- 'Offer A Home' New call for unoccupied property nationally through LA's
- www.offerahome.ie

Communications strategy and central database developed for call

Elements

- 1. One offer instrument protection of the state
- 3. €800 payment (tax free)
- 4. This is specifically for unoccupied property Shared will still go through DCIEDIY
- €50m 'Community Solidarity Recognition Fund' to be announced for supports
 - €57K for Clare under recent Healthy Ireland Initiative
- All agencies to consider large scale accommodation
- Modular accommodation to be increased nationally
- Funding measures to assist transport needs particularly in respect of school transport
- Data sharing and licence agreements (TBF)


